<p><b>1. Mark Making</b> What can you draw with? When we draw or paint with different pens &amp; brushes they make different types of line. Fill a page with marks, lines, dots and dashes using paint or ink and a feather, or twig, your finger, a leaf, a piece of sponge – whatever you can find. Look at the different marks they make.</p>	<p><b>2. Pattern</b> Draw a squiggly line that keeps crossing itself, all over your page, right to the edges. Now add pattern and/or colour to the shapes you have made. You could use lots of different colours or just 2 or 3, or black and white. You could have some that are coloured in and some that aren't.</p>	<p><b>3. Observational Drawing</b> Make a picture of a plant looking very closely at the different shapes of the leaves, petals and stalk and how they fit together. Use pencil crayons to add colour. Remember that you can add yellow or blue pencil on top of your green to make a new hue. Don't forget a shadow if there is one!</p>	<p><b>4. Imaginative Drawing</b> Fill a page with different leaves and flowers from your imagination, books or real life. Think about overlapping and underlapping your drawings, which means drawing them so they look like some are in front and some are behind and cropping them, where they go off the edge of the page.</p>	<p><b>5. Sequential Drawing</b> Draw a carefully observed picture of a biscuit on a piece of paper, now take a small bite and draw it again – look at the biscuits new shape, are there any crumbs? Bite and draw a few times until the biscuit is gone and only crumbs are left! This is a sequential drawing, but why is it called this?</p>
<p><b>6. Imaginative Drawing</b> Draw a page full of beautiful birds. They could all be the same shape and size or lots of different shapes and sizes. Add as much detail, pattern and colour as you like. They could overlap to create an abstract design or add in plants to make an interesting background</p>	<p><b>7. Collage</b> Using your favourite bird, turn it into a colourful collage. You could add in any materials you can find – feathers, buttons, colourful scrap paper, felt, wool or pipe cleaners etc. Remember If you are using paper, you can fold it, pleat it and curl it so that it isn't flat!!!</p>	<p><b>8. Make It</b> Collect different coloured papers from your art supplies or magazines and tear off pieces the size of a 50p. Arrange them in a colour wheel and stick them down. Include primary (red, yellow, blue), secondary (orange, green, purple) &amp; tertiary colours if you can?!</p>	<p><b>9. Cartoon Characters</b> Imagine waking up one morning to find you'd shrunk to the size of your thumb! Draw an illustration of yourself in the grass with insects as big as you are! What details would you see which you might normally miss? You would see things from a different perspective or viewpoint.</p>	<p><b>10. Design</b> Design and make your own minibeast. Your minibeast could crawl or fly, it could have lots of legs or eyes, it could be furry or have a hard shell. You can work on paper or you can make it out of anything you like – salt dough, Lego, junk, paper and card.</p>
<p><b>11. Researching an Artist</b> Copy your favourite illustration from a factual book, such as a train, a flower, a building, an animal, an ancient artefact... Why do you find this picture interesting? Does the picture have written information with it?</p>	<p><b>12. Inspired by Art</b> Make your own illustration of something that interests you. It can be from real life or a photo or book. What would be the best art materials to use? You could write a title, add some labels or a sentence or paragraph of interesting facts.</p>	<p><b>13. Careful Observation</b> Choose a picture of a face that is looking straight at you, from a magazine or print off a photo. Cut the picture in half and stick half onto a piece of drawing paper the same size. Now</p>	<p><b>14. Design and Make</b> Design a secret hideout or den. It could be a labelled diagram or add a background – is it in a tree, at the bottom of the ocean, in the jungle or the side of a glacier? Try building your hideout out of Lego or card and boxes.</p>	<p><b>Bonus Challenge!!!</b> Take a moment to sharpen your pencils, check that your felt tips all work and tidy up your art supplies. Don't forget to underline or add any Art words to your Art dictionary.</p>
